In his homily Fr. Stephen spoke about the pain of grief and how it affects everyone in different ways and in particular, those who suffered a bereavement in the last year. He instanced his own personal grief following the tragic passing of his sister Marie, last year. He said that he can feel her presence around him more now than ever and that he thinks of her every day. He concluded a very poignant homily by saying "grief is painful, but we grieve because we love".

Brian Flanagan on guitar, was the soloist and his selection of music and songs perfectly encapsulated the solemnity of the occasion. At the end of the Mass, Fr. Stephen blessed the little white crosses containing the names of the deceased over the past year which were located beside the potted snowdrops in the Memorial Garden. He thanked Margie Phillips, Enda Caulfield and all who had volunteered in helping to ensure the success of the Remembrance Mass. On the following day prayers were recited in the Friary and Parish Cemeteries.

Holy Communion Preparation

The Grow in Love preparation programme for the children who will receive their First Communion next May continued at the vigil Mass on the 18th of the month. It focussed on introducing the children to the different ways during the month of November, in which our parish remembers and prays for those who have passed away. The soloist for the Mass was Magda Manke, accompanied by Ludmilla on the organ.

Children's Liturgy

The Children's Liturgy for children from 4 to 8 years took place at the 10 o'clock Mass on the last Sunday of the month. The co-ordinators were Ms. Murphy and Ms. Judge of Scoil Íosa.

DECEMBER

Advent commenced with the lighting of the first of the four candles on the advent wreath at the Vigil Mass on the 2nd of the month.

Feast of the Immaculate Conception

The children of Scoil Íosa braved the wind and rain to be present for the 10 o'clock Mass on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception. In an interactive homily, Fr. Stephen spoke about the importance of this feast day to the real meaning of Christmas and the birth of Jesus.

The next segment of the Grow in Love programme for the children who will celebrate the sacraments of Reconciliation and Holy Communion in 2024, went ahead at the Vigil Mass on the 9th. The emphasis was on helping children to learn how to celebrate the birth of Jesus on Christmas Day. Fr. Stephen thanked the parents and guardians for organising the Mass. The soloist for the evening was Oliver Jordan.

Archbishop Francis Duffy

Archbishop Francis Duffy was the celebrant at the weekend Masses on the 16th and 17th. He was very complimentary about the beauty of our church and conveyed to Fr. Stephen his delight at the very warm reception he received from the parishioners.

Christmas

The Family Mass on Christmas Eve began with the blessing of the Crib by Fr. Stephen. Michael and Geraldine Kilcourse with their children Eva Grace and Oisin placed the image of the infant Jesus in it. The readings were done by Margaret Monaghan while Fr. Stephen spoke to the children about the importance of the crib and the role of St. Francis of Assisi in designing the first crib in 1223. After Communion, Brendan Donnellan read a beautiful reflection titled 'A Christmas Prayer' by Robert Louis Stevenson. There was a palpable sense of excitement at the end of the Mass when Santa Claus appeared to speak with the children and to leave a present for baby Jesus. The Scoil Íosa choir under the direction of Ms. Freeley, enriched what was a beautiful liturgy.

There was a festive atmosphere at the Vigil Mass at 9pm. The church with lights dimmed, looked really beautiful.
